In the ghettos and camps and wherever Jews faced Nazi evil, people of faith turned to the Rabbis in their midst for guidance on Jewish law relating to matters of life and death. The Rabbis' responses have come down to us through memoirs and oral testimony, and in some cases through writings that were hidden and retrieved after the war. They bear witness to their spiritual resistance to despair and depravity.
