There are just a few tips to keep in mind when you have the opportunity to take photos:

Fill the frame of the camera's viewfinder or LCD screen with your subjects

Engaging your subjects so they are looking at you and smiling usually yields the best images

Provide "context" to the main subject. It is helpful to have a complementary setting, sign, or other event in the background Using proper exposure, with flash as appropriate, rounds out the basics.

In this series, the photographer created an optimal photo of three young girls enjoying the BBQ (*Success!*) by simply filling the frame and engaging the subjects. *The message: Move in and don't be shy!*
